FROM THE MINISTER

The Soul Matter's theme for this month is **Finding Our Center**. As I contemplated what this would mean, I found a reading by Rev. Joe Cherry, called Risk to be Safe. In it he speaks of a childhood game of playing "it."

When I was a kid and we played tag, there was always something called The Safe Tree. If you were touching this temporarily magical tree (are any trees temporarily magical?) you could not be made "it," or tagged out. The challenge was getting to the tree, because surely it was guarded by the current person who was "it," and whose goal it was to tag you so you would be "it" and they would no longer be that.

To be close to the center, to The Safe Tree, meant you had to risk being vulnerable to the person who could tag you. You had to risk to be safe.

If we think of The Safe Tree as the center, the center of the game, the place of safety, we can come to realize that safety involves some risk, and like the tree, is only temporarily magical.

We light this chalice, a central symbol of our faith, knowing that while the flame of our chalice is only temporary, our faith in its meaning is endless.

This last sentence caught me, faith as the "safe tree" where we can find endless meaning and endless centering. This month consider – where are the "safe trees" in your life and consider how they connect you deeply to yourself, others, and your faith.

Each week will feature a spiritual theme representing one of Side With Love's intersectional justice priorities and a variety of activities will be offered to nourish your spirit and give gratitude and affirmation.

WEEK 2 (Jan. 23-29): Embodiment: LGBTQIA+, Gender & Reproductive Justice

WEEK 3 (Jan. 30 - February 5): Resilience: Climate Justice

WEEK 4 (Feb. 6-12): Healing: Decriminalization

BONUS DAYS (Feb. 13-14): Blessings: Liberatory Intersections

Each week, you can expect to receive several different kinds of offerings, each from a different voice within Unitarian Universalism. Each week's resources will be published by 12pm ET every Monday:

- A weekly Side With Love message, grounded in personal story and offered on our blog and via email and socials, reflecting on the week's spiritual and justice issue themes.
- A Time for All Ages grounded in the week's theme, presented in video and written form, available for free use in your congregation this week or any week which works for you.
- A video of **Body Practice**, suitable for all ages and with attention paid to accessibility for people of varying abilities.
- A thematic **Prayer**, available for use in both video and text formats.
- A thematic **Blessing**, available for use in both video and text formats.
- A **Grounding Practice** to offer at the beginning of gatherings or meetings from our Side With Love Fun & Spiritual Nourishment Squad, available for use in video and facilitator guide formats.

A video can be watched during a lunch break, a prayer shared at the beginning of a family meal and discussed during the meal, or a Time for All Ages story shared with a loved one. A grounding practice can be used to begin committee and board meetings. We will have a Sunday Service based on one of these themes and offerings in late January or mid-February. What's up with all the talk about a person's PRONOUNS? The Unitarian Universalists Association (UUA) has the answers.

Why Adding Pronouns to Email Signatures Matters

At the UUA, we include personal pronouns in our email signatures for the same reason we list our names—so we know what to call one another. Just as we do not know a stranger's name until they tell us, we also do not know another person's pronouns until they let us know what they are.

Many of us were taught as children that we are supposed to assume other people's pronouns, usually based on additional assumptions about that person's gender. However, the practice of assuming another person's pronouns, as well as assuming another person's gender, does not honor that person's identity and experience. (And it's important to note that personal pronouns do not always have to do with someone's gender or lack thereof at all!)

As part of our work to honor the sacred worth and dignity of every person, we are committed to referring to all people using the language they themselves determine to be most appropriate. This includes using pronoun series we may not be familiar with yet.

Many of us regularly use she/her or he/him pronouns when referring to someone in the third person. "She is talking to her friend." "He brought his bike." Singular they/them pronouns are also becoming more widely used to refer to a single individual (though the use of singular they goes back hundreds of years in English). "Their dress is cute. Ask them where they got it." Another pronoun series we might encounter is ze/hir. "Ze built that chair all by hirself." A different variation is ze/zir. "Ze played zir best today. I'm so inspired by zir." There are more pronoun series than these, such as per/pers, xe/xem, and more. If you encounter a pronoun set you are unfamiliar with, do research on how to use them properly. Additionally, some people are referred to by no pronouns, only their name. For a person named Niki who has no pronouns, you would say, "Niki invited us over to Niki's house."

Reach Out with Cedarhurst "Signature" Programs

Cedarhurst hosted four outreach booths at various festivals throughout the Summer with a two-fold purpose. Introduce people to our Unitarian Universalist denomination and Principles and invite them to come to Cedarhurst for a visit and get to know us better. Since then, new faces frequently appear for our Sunday Services. Additionally, more than forty people agreed to get on our mailing to stay in touch via the Weekly Announcements and the *Companion*. Although the numbers are positive, there is an irony as well. People coming to Cedarhurst over the Summer months discovered very eclectic topics being presented in very informal formats. These were enjoyable Summer Services, but not especially meaningful for any first time visitors. So the Outreach Design Team developed a series of programs to offer throughout the Fall and Winter in addition to Sunday Services serve as a more effective way to introduce newcomers to the people attending Cedarhurst and to our UU Faith.

This year, we are offering an array of 'signature' programs to be enjoyed by you and by our newest visitors. Please look them over and reserve time in 2023 to participate, learn and grow. And to welcome and connect with some of the new faces also attending the events.

1. BRAVER ANGELS – Braver Angels is a national non-profit organization that helps heal our political divisiveness by helping people step beyond Red-Blue stereotypes and seek common values. With Cedarhurst as its sponsor, Braver Angels was launched successfully on December 10th through a program at the Westminster Library's Exploration Commons. Fifteen people attended, some from Cedarhurst and some from the wider community. Additional information programs are now being planned for other branch libraries around Carroll County. The goal is to inform more people about this resource and host the first Braver Angels "Red/Blue Workshop" within a few months. The target is in April for a "Red/Blue Workshop" at the Exploration Commons. Thereafter, we foresee sponsoring several more of the Braver Angels worships directed to navigating family communications issues when families gather for the 2023 Holidays.

2. SOUL COLLAGE – SoulCollage[®] is a fun, expressive art process of making small collages from pictures and images that catch your eye. It boosts creativity, intuition, and self-discovery using a special and unique process to nurture your well-being. It's different than typical collages, scrap-booking or vision boarding. It invites you to give visual and poetic expression to the unique tapestry of your life experiences, and to discover and nourish the seeds of your journey. It's a special way to give expression to your inner self.

3. CAKES FOR THE QUEEN OF HEAVEN – This UU Curriculum provides an historical look at the earliest origins of faith and religion and the role that women and the 'female divine' played in those early, pre-Judeo-Christian beliefs. This in-person course will be offered at Cedarhurst in two phases. The first 6 sessions of this 11-session program will be offered in the Fall of 2023, probably in October. The final 5 sessions will be offered in the Winter of 2024. A more extensive description of this popular Adult RE program appears in the December issue of the Companion. Mark your calendars and plan on joining Sherry Dean for this insightful and empowering series.

4. BUILD YOUR OWN THEOLOGY – For many of us, the faith we were raised in is not what we believe today. But it's easy to dismiss those old beliefs; it's much harder to sort through and express what you DO believe. Participate in this UU curriculum that will guide you and other Seekers through exercises that help explore and clarify important parts of the innermost spiritual you.

Each session will focus on inward topics like:

- How has your concept of "god" changed since your childhood?
- What is human nature and my personal nature?

Allow yourself this opportunity to get reacquainted with the really deep parts of your-self.

BYO Theology is an in-person discussion program to be held at Cedarhurst after our Sunday Service beginning in February. Reverend Amy Williams Clarke will lead and guide the group discussion.
