The song *I Wonder as I Wander* keeps flowing through my head as I consider writing this article. It is a beautiful song outlining the Christian story of Christmas and the theology of salvation. 

Inclusion Communication Momentum

This month I want to talk about inclusion.

In July at CERSI (UU summer camp) I was introduced to the concept of pre-emptive radical inclusion\* In simple terms, for us it means: what can we do at CUU to go out of our way to help everyone feel welcome and included? This means not waiting until a person with a particular need walks in our door, but rather already being ready for them, as if they were already in the room. It also means not expecting newcomers to assimilate, but rather to bring themselves fully, as they are, and add to the wonderful mix of people who make up Cedarhurst.

As a congregation, we must decide what we are willing to do, including some renovation of our existing building, to be more inclusive. Our upper level is partially handicapped accessible; our lower level is not at all. This means people of all ages who use canes, walkers, or wheelchairs for mobility cannot go downstairs safely. Our downstairs also does not have consistently reliable heating & air conditioning. Accessibility and comfort impact the classrooms for Religious Exploration, those same rooms for any other event we might host, the nursery, the office area, our minister's office, and the downstairs bathrooms.

The Board has been examining several options and will be presenting a specific proposal for building renovation to the congregation in the new year.

Pre-emptive radical inclusion is a way for us to grow as a congregation – grow in numbers of people who feel included from the start, and also grow as UU's determined to live our principles to the best of our ability.

I hope you agree that CUU must continue to exist and to thrive in Carroll County and the surrounding area. One way for us to make sure that happens is to be pre-emptively, radically inclusive. Making our whole building accessible and comfortable is one way to do this. There are many others.

Next month, I will explore communication, which is as vital in a small congregation as it is in a large one.

# What Makes the Holidays Special to Me



Each year, Dan and I take out the porcelain Nativity Scene that my grandmother poured, fired, and hand painted. Grandmother would create these scenes for each of her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren born while she was alive. Each of us were gifted with what she called the "beginner set" which included an angel, manger, the baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph, and a donkey. Each following year she would send us one or two pieces until we had the whole set including a cow, sheep, shepherds, wisemen, and camels.

Every year, Dan and I take out these treasured items, lovingly unwrap them from their protective wrapping, and place them on our table. As we lay out each piece we tell the story of Christ's birth, but with a twist. The twist is that Dan studied ancient Greek and will intersperse the story with the Greek names for each item. So manger becomes fatni, angel becomes angelos, sheep become probaton, shepard becomes poimenas, wisemen becomes magi and so on and so forth. We do this until each piece is out and placed. Though we each insist that they are placed correctly, somehow each piece is moved to the "right spot." We do this throughout the season until it is time to lovingly put away the nativity and store it until the coming year. -Reverend Amy



Every year at holiday time, I pull out these two vinyl LP's and remember the best choir I ever sang in, the Birmingham Southern College concert choir. Our Director was Dr. Hugh Thomas, whose musicality and sensitivity brought out the best in all of us. We were so well trained that while we were recording "Silent Night" Dr. Thomas decided to record just one verse. All eyes were on him as he motioned to us to stop singing at the end of that verse. It was a magical moment, and the recording reflects that.

# What Makes the Holidays Special to Me



My parents bought a heavenly, densely wooded seven acres of New Hampshire wilderness in 1964. I was 12 years old. Our property bordered Cub Pond, a sparkling dream in the summer. Secluded, two miles in on a rutted, rock-strewn dirt tractor path, no electricity or running water, under the strict control of Mosquitoes Unlimited, our property was, nonetheless, all ours!

Our Christmas Tradition became finding our very own Christmas tree from our very own forest.

Cub Pond in the winter was a silent wonderland of up-to-your-knees snow blanketing rolling hills of deep fallen leaves, streams, and downed tree limbs. We'd trudge the two miles in on the unplowed trail to our property on Saturday before Christmas. My parents, sister, and I would wander about, our necks craned so we could look straight up to the tops of the trees to find The Perfect One.

You see, those Christmas trees we're all familiar with don't actually exist in a forest. Not enough sunlight makes it to the ground, so the pines reach their branches high to the sky to grab hold of as many rays as they can. The only dense growth exists far, far above.

We'd decide on The Perfect One. We'd chop and saw the magnificent pine until it crashed to the ground in a thunderous avalanche of snow and broken branches. In excited anticipation, we'd heave ourselves through the snow to reach the top of the pine and behold what would be our Christmas Tree.

After we hauled the tree-top home, my father would spend hours drilling holes in the many bare spots of our tree-to-be, to fill the gaps with the branches we'd cut from the lower part of the tree. We'd set up the result in whatever spot we could find that would require the removal of the fewest pieces of furniture. What had been a small bit of tree in the forest was a gigantic monstrosity in a suburban home.

Then we'd stand back to admire Our Very Own Christmas Tree. And try really, really hard to love it.

Okay, so I exaggerated. Our Christmas Tradition lasted only two years. But such memories! -Becky Barbour
