But all of that seems... inappropriate, these few days before one of the (if not The) most important elections of our still young nation. I'm not going to sugar-coat it and suggest that our political differences don't matter to our relationships. We know that's not true, when political differences mean the survival of so many groups of people it nearly encompasses everyone. It's hard, if not impossible, to maintain relationships with people who refuse to see the inherent worth and dignity of other people, who support policies that take away safety and rights and all the things we hold dear.

Grace – our theme for the month – is so important as we navigate what can seem too hard to face; yes, we must remember that behind the anger and hate is a person feeling and experiencing things we can't imagine, and often behind the anger is fear. So we must show a bit of grace for the hurting human inside.

And then... we wait. It's likely, given the last few cycles, that we won't know anything for a few days or weeks. But we'll be together on November 10, and we'll talk about what's next. And together, we will do the next right thing. And the next. And the next one after that.

Elevate Cedarhurst! Update

The processes of adding to and renovating a building can be disruptive. The first physical change at CUU will involve drilling a new well, which will then be connected to the building's internal water pipes. Water currently enters CUU via the boiler room, but the new water supply will be distributed from the small room outside the downstairs restrooms. To accommodate this, things that are currently stored in that room may soon have to be either relocated or discarded.

We should all be aware of the need to declutter the building in preparation for the construction. Multiple past efforts to reduce the amount of stuff in the building have been successful as far as they have gone, and we will soon need another such organized effort to reduce the quantity of stuff in the building and organize what's left. But after each such clean-up day, new stuff comes along and soon there's clutter again. So before you bring anything into CUU that isn't either consumable or an auction donation, please ask yourself, "Does CUU really need this now?"

To learn more about decluttering, I recommend Linnea Gustafsson's book *The Gentle Art of Swedish Death Cleaning* and the Netflix series with the same name. (NOTE: They're not about death; they're about living your best life.) I also recommend Marie Kondo's Netflix series *Tidying Up*. These resources focus on tidying homes, but the same principles can be applied when it's time to tackle CUU's current clutter.

FEED THE HUNGRY

Thanks to your generous monetary donations and contributions of food, we provided food for 130 in September and 130 in October. We have six to eight people each month who help provide the food, some who are friends of the congregation.

We provided a lunch of grilled cheese, 5 different sandwiches, chili, chicken noodle soup and salads along with desserts and drinks at the **Loaves and Fishes** held at Westminster Church of the Brethren September 7 and a similar lunch October 5th. We served about 50 people each month, with about 30 take-outs.

We continue to provide food at the **Night-by-Night Shelter** on the third Friday of each month in Westminster, located near the Westminster Senior Center. The shelter is open to any adult who needs a meal and a place to eat. They also provide laundry and showers.

The need has grown each month, increasing from 25 to 55 dinners! Before Covid, we arrived to about 5-10 people waiting at the door. We now have about 30 people. Since we bring dinner just once a month, we have decided to simplify our efforts by alternating our menu to a variety of casseroles one month and chili the next. We add assorted sides, a donation of four dozen rolls from Texas Roadhouse and drinks.

With the increase of need, CUU has committed a donation of \$40 to support the effort. Your donations also add to the variety of food being served.



November's book is **Death with Interruptions** by Jose Saramago.


Nobel Prize-winner Jose Saramago's brilliant new novel poses the question what happens when the grim reaper decides there will be no more death?
