And it's not like summer suddenly happens. Unlike a snowstorm to mark the start of winter, or the very first red buds or yellow tinges to mark spring and fall, summer just creeps in. It's spring, and then without paying attention, it's summer. We might have some personal markers – the end of the school year, opening the summer cottage, putting the boat in the water, the first burgers on the grill – but really, by the time we do all that, summer's already happened.

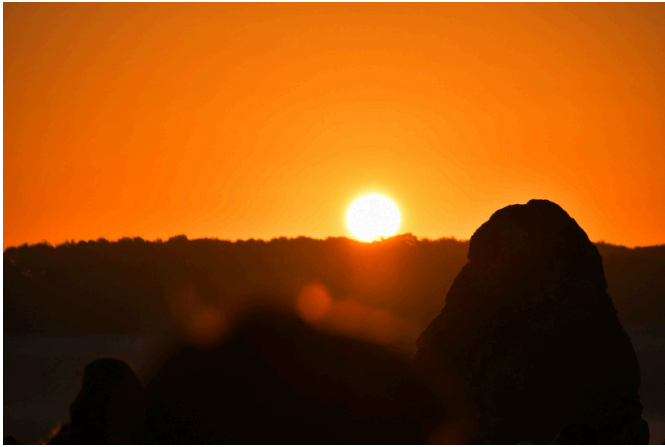

Astronomically speaking – for the northern hemisphere – the summer solstice occurs when the sun reaches the Tropic of Cancer, and we experience the longest day and the shortest night of the year. Summer officially starts on June 20 at 6:34am. On that day, here on the North Fork, we will see 15 hours and eight minutes of daylight. Because of our longitude and latitude, we're used to the summer days turning into summer nights by around 9:30, so when I spent midsummer in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, I was in for a surprise. We had planned a bonfire and ritual to start when it got dark – in the evening hours, we had dinner, dessert, drinks, conversation. We waited. And waited. More drinks, more conversation. And we waited. More drinks, and more food so we weren't too inebriated to light the bonfire. When it finally got dark, it was nearly midnight. It was quite the experience, truly feeling the length of the midsummer day. While we'd been celebrating in some form all evening, we felt the need to sing and rejoice in the dancing firelight.

It's no wonder the ancients celebrated this day so fervently. How scary the winter solstice must have felt, with its short, gray days and long, unending nights. Is it any wonder that they worried about the sun returning? Summer brought joy: The snow was gone, and the earth was bathed in warmth and green. Food was easier to find. Crops had been planted. The very thing that meant life or death – the sun – had returned. The ancients celebrated the time of year with festivals, rituals, and weddings. To this

day, we have ancient sites in Northern Europe that were raised to celebrate midsummer – the most famous of course being Stonehenge, where rituals are still held today to celebrate the long days full of sunlight.

So what does all this sunlight do? For starters, it shows us where we are.

We forget sometimes that we are always home – on earth (unless you're an astronaut, of course). The summer solstice gives us a great gift – a chance to see the most of our home, in the bright light of day.



If you have traveled at all, you have probably had this experience: you arrive in a new city, in a new hotel room very late one night. It's dark, and really, all you want to do is go to sleep. You have no sense of your surroundings – which is not that bad, really, because sleep beckons. However, in the morning, you open your curtains – and you see a beautiful vista... or the street...or the dumpsters. But no matter what you see, in the light of day, you get to see your surroundings.

Such is the nature of the solstice. We exist in our world, with plenty of darkness around it – and then, before we realize it, we are having long days... and we get to see what's around us. We get to see our world.

And what a world it is. Oceans and mountains, deserts and plains, forests and savannas, and everything in between. Just traveling around the US reveals just about every climate, every type of terrain. Cross the ocean and we get even more – more stunning mountains, deserts, coastlines, tundras.



It is amazing, and it is no wonder we want to travel, especially in the summer, when the days are long and we can see our world, in the light of day.

Yet as much as we travel, the earth reminds us that we are always home. And that is something. Peggy Lee's song "Is that all there is" haunts my thoughts when I consider the infinitesimal odds that allow intelligent life to exist at all. But as scary as those thoughts can be at times, there is incredible comfort when we turn our thoughts to home – this home. One only has to recall the

now famous image of Earth taken from space – the big blue marble – to remember the longing we have for our home. I suppose it is small comfort that we are unlikely to ever leave Earth – we will never leave our home.

And so the Solstice calls on us to celebrate. May you enjoy your answer to summer's call – with time to explore, warmth to bathe in, opportunity to play.

President's Message

My Two-Year Adventure as Board President

This is my last column as your President, and I want you to read it all! There is so much going on at Cedarhurst, and the most exciting part to me is how people are pitching in and getting all kinds of things done. Whether you're at the building, or doing everything online, take a moment and thank someone who has taken on a "Small Wins" task! It's amazing to see the puzzle pieces go up on the wall as something gets taken care of or taken ownership of.

One of my three points of focus as I began my term in 2023 was **momentum**. That came from my recognizing that congregations all over the country and in every denomination & faith were still struggling as the pandemic slowly faded. Do you remember how confused and frustrated we all were? My predecessor, Francine Hahn, was left with "How do we restart? When can we dispense with mandatory mask-wearing? How do we reopen and reconnect, while still protecting our health?" Not an enviable position to be in as a leader!

When I began my term, these were mostly questions of the past – but the post-pandemic "normal" was still a bit shaky. We continued with hybrid (multi-platform) services, and anyone who has attended more than one of them knows that these can be quite challenging from a tech standpoint. Kudos to our tech crew who have been doing their best every Sunday to create a meaningful worship experience for our TWO congregations – the in-person attendees, and the Zoom attendees.

That brings me to my second point of focus for my presidency, **inclusion**. I added that to my platform because I had been learning about a new concept to me, Preemptive Radical Inclusion, from C.B. Beal. They were the keynote speaker in 2022 at the Central East Region Summer Institute, and more recently they were a remote guest speaker here at Cedarhurst. Inclusion (let alone the preemptive radical kind) is something that requires intention, pre-planning, consideration of others – all others, and patience. Many congregations, business groups, clubs, and other organizations

gave up on hybrid meetings after the pandemic. It was either all in-person, or all on Zoom (or other platforms). But here at Cedarhurst, we persevered because we recognized that, by offering the Zoom option for our services, we not only gained new members, but made it possible for anyone to attend worship while sick, injured, traveling, etc. This became super important to me personally this winter and spring, as I needed to avoid crowds during my cancer journey.

Finally, my platform included **communication**. This is perhaps the hardest one of all. The fact that you're still reading my column right now is an indicator of good communication, so thank you! To complete that communication, why not send me an email or text that says, "I read your column!" You can even say "I didn't like it" and tell me why!

But seriously, in my evaluation of the last two years, I would say that communication is the thing we've somewhat improved here at Cedarhurst, but we have a ways to go. Full disclosure: I found it easier to talk about than to do anything about, though I did try in certain areas. For my part, I kept up with my BP email regularly and responded in a timely manner almost all of the time. I kept in touch with the Board and our minister frequently (Rev. Kimberley and I had lunch together once a month, and it usually lasted 1 ½ to 2 hours...we covered a lot of ground). Sometimes I forgot to reach out to the Congregational Life committee, when planning a lunch for instance. I would get a call from Beth Schilpp saying "It says here in the announcements that there's lunch after worship on [insert date]. Are you cooking the lunch, or is it potluck, or is my committee handling it?" I would respond with "Oops! Let's figure that out!" (Beth was always nice about it!)

My hope is that my successor (still to be determined at this writing) will keep up the momentum, inclusion, and communication I've worked on during my term. But, as with a lot of things in my life right now, I'm learning to let go and let the universe sort it out! I know that whoever your next Board President is, they will be committed to both the present and future of this wonderful congregation. They will be committed to the values and principles all UU's embrace. They will want you to provide feedback to them, to the minister, and to the rest of the Board. The more we all communicate openly and honestly with each other, the better we will be. The better our communication, the better we can be at inclusion (let someone know if you feel left out in any way), and as we communicate and improve our efforts at full inclusion of all, our momentum will gain traction and continue to move us to where we want to be.

Thank you for being such a supportive congregation during my time as Board President. It has truly been a pleasure to serve you, and I look forward to many years of continued fellowship, growth, inspiration, laughter, and living out our faith together.

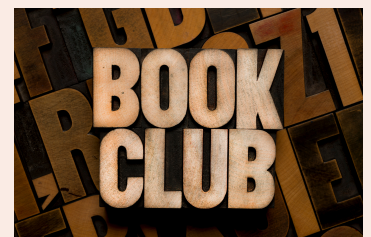
